## A motion of importance to be considered at the OHS Annual General Meeting on Dec 8th

#### **Motion to Revise Bylaws**

 Several years ago, the fiscal year end of our Society was changed to be October 31<sup>st</sup>. Based on recommendations from the OHA, we revised our bylaws to hold our AGM in November. However in practice it is not possible to have our financials properly audited and presented for a November General Meeting, which is typically less than two weeks after the year end. The executive of the OHS is considering putting forward the following change to the bylaws of the OHS

WHEREAS, there is insufficient time to prepare an audited financial statement for a November AGM given the October 31<sup>st</sup> fiscal yearend.

RESOLVED, That the OHS Bylaws, Article 2 – Meetings, Section 2 – be amended to read:

The society shall hold its Annual Meeting during the month of **December** at which time:

- The Executive Committee shall be elected and installed
- The President shall present a report of the activities and the accomplishments of the Society during its preceding year
- The Treasurer shall present the audited financial statement for the preceding year, and the budget for the current year, for approval by the Membership.
