Guidelines:

Only one entry per exhibitor is permitted in each class. Each entry must be the work of the exhibitor and must have been taken within the last 24 months. **Photos for OHA competition** must have been taken in Ontario. All entries must be 4 x 6 inches in size, matted to 5 x 7 inch. For the OHS shows, You may mount your work but consider matting your photo rather than

mounting it.

A matte sits over your photo and helps set your photo off from the background in ways mounting may not. Photos may not be entered in frames. No name, date, title of any kind is permitted on the front side of the photograph.

All photos should reflect the theme and contain some horticultural materials.

The judging scale for photographs: Horticultural Value 40% Photographic Value 40% Appearance and Impact 20%
