President's Remarks for March 2015

Fields of Spring

Here we are more than half way through winter and looking forward to spring. This spring will be a special one for us, as we will have two lovely, naturalized daffodil fields to greet us. One is at the park beside the Colborne Seniors Centre. The other is in Postridge Park in northeast Oakville. These soon-tobe seen daffodil fields exist because of the dedicated work of several persons with an incredible vision.

The "Fields of Spring" were the brainchild of Margaret Jeffery. She had the vision, came up with a viable plan and budget, and proposed the plan to the OHS and the Town of Oakville.

Once the proposal was enthusiastically accepted, Margaret worked with the Town to locate suitable sites. She developed a plan and researched the varieties of bulbs that would best suit the chosen sites. Margaret and her husband Gilbert then purchased transported and sorted the bulbs. Margaret, Gilbert, and Cathy, we enthusiastically thank you for all your diligent work and your vision.

The Town of Oakville prepared the land - not an easy job in Oakville's stony southern soil and the red clay in the north.

Margaret and Cathy marked out the planting grid and invited members of the Oakville Horticultural Society and the Bronte Horticultural Society to join forces to plant the over 4000 daffodil bulbs. This turned into a wonderful opportunity for getting to know our fellow Bronte gardeners better. We hope this will be the first of many opportunities for the OHS to join with Bronte and other garden clubs in future joint ventures. Many sincere thanks go out to all our planters.

Once planted, Margaret and Cathy raked and seeded the plots with eco-lawn grass seed. The Town of Oakville will be responsible for the watering and care of the naturalized sites over the next two years until the sites are well established. OHS members, under Margaret's guidance, will deadhead and weed the plots and over seed as needed. 
April Meeting: Monday, 13th, 2015

AOC: Any Other Cultivar, means any other cultivar/ variety/species not listed in the schedule. *Please Note:*

All show entries -- design, horticulture, photography -- must be in place in the upstairs hall by 7:20 pm, prior to commencement of judging.

Guidelines:

All entries must be grown by the exhibitor.

Exhibitors are allowed three entries in each section, provided each specimen is a different cultivar.

When a height limit is specified for an annual or perennial, this refers to the growing height of the plant not the cut length of the specimen. Where 3 specimens of the same cultivar are asked for, the specimens should be uniform, free of disease or insect damage and at an appropriate stage of maturity

Educational Exhibit: This exhibit will be scored out of 5 points and the points will count toward trophies. Educational exhibits are designed to instruct the viewer in some aspect of horticulture (e.g., plant propagation, environment, endangered plant preservation, etc). The exhibit must contain plant material and should include both botanical and common plant names. It should also mention plant origin, habitat, culture (how it is grown), usage and history. The exhibit will also be judged on clear, concise presentation, attractiveness, quality and condition of plant material, originality and creativity. (O.J.E.S. pg. 76)

AOC: The "Any Other Cultivar" class has been added for plants that do not fall into any other show category. (O.J.E.S. pg. 90)

Judges follow the "Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards for Horticulture and Floral Design, Publication 34 / 2003," (O.J.E.S.) published by the Ontario Horticultural Association and Garden Clubs of Ontario. Judges may disqualify entries that do not follow the guidelines. A copy of Publication 34 can be found in our Library or you may purchase a copy from the Society.

FLOWER SHOW

FLOWER SHOW GENERAL RULES

- I. Competition open to any paid-up District 6 Society member.
- All entries judged according to the Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards for Horticulture and Floral Design, Publication 34, 2003 Edition.
- 3. All entries must be placed between 9:00 am and 9:45 am.
- Exhibitors are responsible for completing an entry tag for each entry and for correct placement of their entries. Entry cards will be provided in the niches for all classes in Division I and Division III.
- 5. Entries are to remain in place until the close of the show.
- All reasonable care will be taken of exhibitors* property, but the Oakville
 Horticultural Society will not be responsible for loss or damage.
- 7. The decision of the judges is final. Ribbons will be awarded on merit.

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FLOWER SHOW GENERAL RULES (continued)

DIVISION I - DESIGN RULES

- 8. Fresh plant material may be obtained from any source.
- 9. No artificial plant material or cut fruit is allowed.
- 10. Accessories and dried plant materials are permitted as allowed by the schedule.
- II. Only one entry per exhibitor is permitted in any design class.
- 12. All classes must be pre-registered.

DIVISION II - HORTICULTURE RULES

- The exhibitor is permitted two entries per class, provided they are of a different cultivar.
- Potted plants must have been owned by the exhibitor for at least 3 months prior to the show.
- 15. Exhibitors must provide their own containers.
- 16. Classes will be staged on white tables 30" from the floor.
- 17. Classes may be sub-divided at the discretion of the show chair.

DIVISION III - SPECIAL EXHIBITS RULES

- 18. Class must be pre-registered.
- 19. Special exhibits are judged for both horticultural perfection and design.
- Plants must have compatible cultural requirements but with variations of colour, form, texture, and pattern for visual effect.

DIVISION I - DESIGN

- Class I. "Flush of Colour" a small design, no larger than 10" in any direction in a 12" x 12" x 12" black niche. 6 entries.
- Class 2. "Spring by the Lakes" a water-viewing design in a space 30" wide x 30" deep, height unrestricted, with a grey block wall background. 6 entries.
- Class 3. "Carolinian Landscape" a design in a space 30" wide x 30" deep, height unrestricted, with a grey block wall background. 6 entries.
- Class 4. "Early Spring Beauty" a miniature fresh plant material design in an off-white niche 5" high \times 4 I/2" wide \times 3" deep. 8 entries
- Class 5. "Preserved Beauty" a miniature dried-plant material design in an off-white niche 5" high \times 4 I/2" wide \times 3" deep. 8 entries

DIVISION II - HORTICULTURE

Please provide your own containers.

Class 6: Collection of small spring flowers, minimum of three cultivars, named

Class 7: Hyacinth - one stem

Class 8: Narcissus/Daffodil - collection of three cultivars, one scape of each

Class 9: Narcissus, other than miniature - one scape

Class 10: Narcissus, miniature - three scapes, same cultivar

Class II: Tulip - one stem, any colour

Class 12: Tulip - collection of at least three cultivars, one stem of each

Class I3: Any small bulb (e.g., chinodoxa, scilla, muscari), three stems, same cultivar

Class 14: Perennial - three stems, same cultivar

Class 15: Houseplant grown for flowers or fruit - one pot, one plant per pot

Class 16: Houseplant grown for foliage - one pot, one plant per pot

Class 17: Any other Cultivar - one stem
