HIGHWAY OF HEROES PROJECT

INTRODUCTION OF HIGHWAY OF HEROES PROJECT: Ontario's Macdonald-Cartier Freeway, better known as Highway 401, is the main transportation corridor linking Windsor with Quebec City, and crosses through some of the most densely populated areas in Canada. In 2007, a 170 kilometre portion of the highway stretching from CFB Trenton to the Don Valley Parkway (and later Keele Street) in Toronto was designated the Highway of Heroes, reflecting its use as the route for funeral convoys carrying fallen Canadian Forces service men and women from CFB Trenton to the coroner's office in Toronto.

This designation honours those men and women who have made such a vital contribution to our way of life, and offers a wonderful opportunity to tell the story of Canadian Veterans. Our goal is to implement a large-scale planting program (117,000 trees) and create a series of elements along the roadway that will remind those who pass by of the great debt we owe these courageous Canadians.

All money raised goes directly to tree planting, as all administrative costs have been covered by a private donor. All trees to be planted are native species.

(IAS) - An update by Larry Urbanoski



Last year Oakville Horticultural Society participated in a number of new activities to combat non-native invasive species in our community. As an example, OHS members attended workshops related to the EDRR (<u>Early Detection & Rapid</u> <u>Response</u>) program - a proactive approach to stop the establishment of invasive plant populations in Ontario. Through these workshops, OHS members connected with other like-minded organizations based in Halton and Peel. We shared information and expertise about the species of most concern in our area like garlic mustard, common reed grass and buckthorn.

While OHS has previously championed garlic mustard removal in Oakville, this past year, buckthorn has been our target. Buckthorn has become a prominent

part of Oakville's urban forest. Like garlic mustard, its ability to out-compete native species and degrade wildlife habitat has moved it on to the top ten list of invasive species of concern within Ontario. Not only does it threaten native biodiversity, but it also poses a threat to agriculture as it can serve as a host for crown rust of oats as well as soybean aphids. European buckthorn (*Rhamnus cathartica*) is now listed as a noxious weed under Ontario's Weed Control Act.

In November 2015, OHS participated in an event to remove buckthorn from a nature trail in the Glen Abbey area. This event was a collaborative effort with the organization POWER (Protect Our Water and Environmental Resources) and the Town of Oakville. While progress was made, there is still a significant infestation of buckthorn along the Glen Oak Creek Trail and further work is needed to halt its growth.

Thus OHS is joining forces with POWER, the Town of Oakville and a new partner, Oakvillegreen Conservation Association, to eradicate buckthorn from this valley. The activity is scheduled for the morning of Thursday, June 9th. We will meet at the <u>Glen Oak Creek Trail</u> head on Nottinghill Gate at 9 a.m. and divide up into teams. You will learn how to identify two species of buckthorn and how to use an extractigator ... lots of fun. Please, join the volunteers from these other organizations in our effort to promote biodiversity and improve our local environment.
